# A message from Corinne

Recently I have been reflecting on The Message's interpretation of John 1: 14 which says 'The Word became flesh and blood and moved into the neighbourhood', and in particular what that means for us when we are unable to inhabit our neighbourhood as usual. 'As I write the government is beginning to ease its Coronavirus lockdown measures: 'the shops are reopening, and we are now allowed to socialise in the open air (at a safe distance of course). However, at the beginning of lockdown there were few people out and about in Bristol – the neighbourhood was deserted! For those experiencing homelessness this was a real challenge, because shelters and day centres like ours closed overnight, and little food was available.

The work of the Methodist Centre might be described as a particularly incarnational ministry: we seek to embody God's love and care practically - through the meals, laundry, shower and computer facilities we offer. It has been challenging to reinvent the way we offer such care safely over the last 3 months. We have worked closely with other charities in the city to consider how best to support those on the streets and, as a result, have provided a door service two days a week, offering a hot takeaway meal. The Circuit has also joined other Bristol charities to serve hot meals each evening from Champion Square to those not placed in emergency accommodation.

However, part of the role of the Bristol Methodist Centre (and another way in which we seek to make God's love tangible) is also to create community. Whilst we have been able to meet some practical needs during the pandemic, it has been far harder to continue to build relationships with our guests, and to 'walk with them' as they face hardship. As such, snatched conversations at the door have become very precious. There have been moments of real joy when we have finally caught up with someone we have not seen during the pandemic, and found they are doing well. It has been humbling to hear, time and time again, 'thank you for just being here.'

I have been reminded how easy it is to focus on meeting practical needs, and to forget we serve a God who seeks a relationship with us, delights when we 'show up' and never leaves us on our own! As we continue to work out how best to serve those experiencing homelessness in these changing times, please pray we might be able to reveal God's love and care for all we encounter.



## Become a BMC regular donor

Over the last 5 years we have seen the number of those who access the Centre increase. We regularly feed 100 guests a day, with more passing through the building for support, access to showers and to collect their post. As a result our costs have risen significantly. In particular we have had to increase staffing to ensure the safety and well being of all. (For those who supported us during the move from Midland Road, Old Market this may well come as a surprise as, at that time, need for the service was anticipated to decrease. If only that were the case!)

Generous gifts from donors and the churches that support us comprise approximately one guarter of all our income. The balance in part comes from our charity shop Street Folk, and grant funding. However, grant applications can rarely be used to cover our major cost, which is staffing. We need to continue to raise an additional **£65.000** a year to offer that which our guests consider an essential service. Regular giving can help us plan throughout the year, and for the future.

Please would you consider becoming a regular donor? A relatively small monthly donation can make a big difference:

- **£5** could provide lunch for 20 guests;
- **£10** essential telephone services for a month:
- **£15** enable the Centre to be cleaned for a week:
- **£25** could provide lunch for a day.

If you are a UK taxpayer, using Gift Aid can also make your donation go further (for every pound you give, we receive an extra 25 pence from the Inland Revenue).


