The Bristol Methodist Centre is a Christian community offering shelter, sanctuary and support to homeless and vulnerable people. The Centre provides a drop-in service where people can get free meals, clean clothes and a shower. Support staff are on hand each day to help with various problems; and guests are welcome to take part in the regular pattern of prayer and worship in the small chapel. Guests are also able to use phones, or charge their own as well as make use of the internet. The work is funded entirely by voluntary contributions and we receive no local authority funding.

I was once approached by a complete stranger on a train who wanted to share his good news with me. After several years unemployed he had just been offered a job. He was bursting to share the news and I was there and although I didn't know him I was happy to share his good news.

In contrast our TVs, radios and newspapers so

often focus on the world's bad news be it an international crisis (which we need to be made aware of) or someone's personal tragedy that we really don't need to be informed of. Good News they tell us simply doesn't sell. We can all so easily get caught up in other people's misery that we can forget that behind the stories are real people.

I'm sure that we have all had times when we have been bursting to tell someone our newsgood or bad and there being no one to tell. Just having the affirmation of another person is so encouraging and builds self esteem.

For some who come to the Methodist Centre they can

often find themselves in the same situation as the person I met on the train, having good news they want to share and yet having no one to share it with. Likewise they may be experiencing difficulties and need someone to talk to about it. It's always a privilege to hear others news validating the individual.
